

New this year!

Taste of Mexico Program

This summer we offered a unique cultural experience for all students ages 6 to 13 years old. Our Taste of Mexico program exposed students to the rich culture and traditions of three of Mexico's most fascinating states; Jalisco, Veracruz and Zacatecas. We hosted four highly qualified guest teachers from Mexico who taught the students folkloric dances, Spanish, and manual and culinary arts.





Our students also learned Mexican history, legends and traditions from these states. This program was a huge hit with our students and they benefited greatly by gaining global awareness through fun learning activities.



Early Childhood Education

La Casa de Esperanza provides high-quality, dual language, Early Childhood Education and School Age services to the Waukesha community. We believe in creating an environment in which every child has the opportunity to develop the knowledge, skills, reasoning ability, creativity and independence needed for positive personal growth and success in the education system and beyond. Our caring, experienced and qualified faculty provide programs for children from 6 weeks to 13 years.

In 2019, La Casa' Early Childhood Education Program began providing dual language programming for all children, infants through 5 years of age. We are so excited that our children will have the opportunity to develop this strong foundation in both English and Spanish, upon which to continue to build throughout their school years, and be fully fluent in both languages (speaking, reading, and writing) as adults.

The program continues its rating as a five star program, the highest rating given by the State of Wisconsin, and is nationally accredited. This ensures that the children we serve, who are most in need and most at risk, are provided the highest quality early education possible. We believe that providing the highest quality early education will lay the foundation for their future success in school and throughout their lifetimes.

The program provides:

- Center-based early childhood education programming Monday through Friday, 6:00 a.m.—7:00 p.m.
- Center based services, free of charge, for children enrolled in its Early Head Start Program.
- Homebased programming for children birth through three years of age through its homebased Early Head Start Program.
- ◆ Before and After School programs for children ages 5 through 13 years who attend the La Casa de Esperanza Charter School as well as other Waukesha Public Schools.

Impacting Students

Charter School



The La Casa de Esperanza Charter School is authorized by the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee and, in 2019, served students in grades K4 to 4th grade at no cost to parents. We have highly qualified teachers who meet all Wisconsin State Standards. Our pilot dual language program was expanded this year to include K4 and K5 classrooms. Students from various ethnic backgrounds are enrolled in the dual language program and are being taught in both Spanish and English. In addition, we offer our students a variety of culturally relevant events as well as physical education, art, theater and a variety of extracurricular classes. Our goal is to develop high performing students who are thankful and give back to their community.

Following a review by the UWM Office of Charter Schools and meeting of the Board of Regents, the La Casa de Esperanza Charter School contract was renewed. The school has been approved to open 5th and 6th grades and to add dual language classrooms, in addition to English instruction classrooms, in all grades.

Through the efforts of various community partners, our students were able to participate in specialized classes this year.

- Our students participated in theater classes taught by a member of the Waukesha Civic Theater.
- Students learned how to play violins through a partnership with El Sistema, a music school located in Waukesha.
- Our first Robotics club was formed through our partnership with COPE, Community of Professional Engineers.

The La Casa de Esperanza Charter School was proud to partner with SHARP Literacy and Carroll University for our Charter School students. Basketball players from Carroll University spent Tuesday mornings at La Casa de Esperanza reading with our Charter School students. This program has been named "Reading with the Pios".

Impacting Families

Center for Financial Stability

The mission of the Center for Financial Stability is to impact the lives of individuals and families by helping them achieve and sustain financial stability and self-sufficiency through education, coaching, and asset building activities and services. In 2019, the Center for Financial Stability was awarded certification from HUD as a Housing Counseling Agency to assist first time homebuyers. Also this year, the Center for Financial Stability was awarded a State of Wisconsin Workforce Development Fast Forward grant to train unemployed and underemployed individuals to obtain certification in five areas of the construction trades.

Services include:

- Employment & Training
- Employer-Based Financial Wellness
- Financial Coaching
- Financial Literacy Education
- VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance)
- Homebuyer Program

In 2019 the Center for Financial Stability:

- Completed 1,805 income tax returns, with over 50 volunteers, returning over \$3.2 million to clients
- Generated 260 TransUnion credit reports and provided credit counseling
- Assisted 355 clients to improve employability and 299 obtain employment
- ◆ Increased client compensation by \$3,148,823
- Provided employer-based financial wellness to over 1000 clients
- Provided individual counseling to 515 FSI clients
- ♦ 98% of clients report having more confidence in making financial decisions

Impacting Seniors

La Casa Village I & II



La Casa Village I & II provide affordable, safe housing for low-income senior citizens and mobility impaired individuals. We offer a wide range of educational and social opportunities for the residents in a friendly, supportive environment. Tenants pay 30% of their adjusted income for rent. La Casa Village I is overseen by WHEDA (Wisconsin Housing Economic Development Authority) & HUD (US Department of Housing and Urban Development) and La Casa Village II is overseen by HUD (US Department of Housing and Urban Development).

This year our seniors implemented an exercise class in collaboration with the UW Extension. The seniors learned exercises they can do while at home, and healthy eating habits. These classes were held twice each week. By participating in the classes, seniors have improved:

- Movement
- Weight loss
- Confidence
- Overall improved health

Seniors continue to exercise and take control of their health.



Volunteer Impact of ProHealth Care







This past summer several ProHealth Care staff members volunteered at La Casa Village I & II. These volunteers provided opportunities for our seniors to enjoy the outdoors. One of the major projects included building a pergola so tenants can spend time outdoors, enjoy the fresh air and and socialize. A second group helped paint and make improvements to outdoor areas including landscaping. The seniors have enjoyed their outside areas, which creates a sense of community for them. In addition to working at the Villages, ProHealth Care volunteers assisted in our other programs sorting books, painting classrooms, making activities for our children and landscaping.

Impacting the Environment

Weatherization

La Casa de Esperanza's Weatherization Assistance Program provides services to individuals and families who are eligible and receive Energy Assistance benefits in Jefferson, Waukesha and Milwaukee counties. The program completes weatherization work at no cost to the customers. The work can include:

- Air sealing
- Insulation (attic and/or exterior walls)
- Heating system replacement or repair
- Water-saving items
- Smoke and carbon monoxide alarms
- Re-venting dryers

Households that qualify carry a larger burden for energy costs, typically spending 16.3% of their total annual income versus 3.5% for other households (2014 Oakridge Renewable National Laboratory study). Often, they must cut back on healthcare, medicine, groceries, or childcare to pay their energy bills.



In addition to the direct monetary energy savings benefits for each household receiving weatherization services, there are also non-energy saving benefits achieved through the program.

These may include:

- Homes are more comfortable and livable
- Decrease in house fires
- Visits to a hospital or doctor are decreased for individuals with respiratory health concerns
- Individuals who have their home weatherized miss fewer days of work or school due to increased indoor air quality in their home

Program Highlights:


- Weatherized a total of 1,044 units from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019
- The lifetime energy saving dollars equate to nearly \$6.3 million dollars for these units
- An estimated 3,922 barrels of oil will be saved because of the work completed on these units
- An estimated 4,542 metric tons of carbon dioxide, a greenhouse gas thought to contribute to global warming, is saved from going into the atmosphere. This equates to 546 cars removed from the roads.




Revenue Sources
